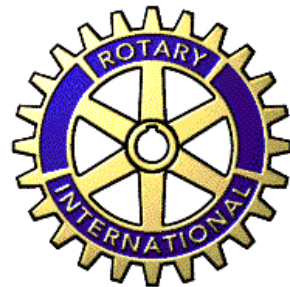

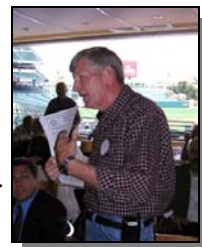

Rear Admiral Richard Lyon, USNR (RET.)

You won't want to miss out on next week's exciting program—Rear Admiral Richard Lyon!

Admiral Lyon, the son of the late Captain and Mrs. Norman M. Lyon, USNR (Ret.), was born on July 14, 1923 in Pasadena and is a fifth-generation Californian. He attended Yale University as a Western Regional Scholar, graduated with engineering honors in 1944 and received his master's degree in business administration from Stanford University in 1953.

He enlisted as a Seaman Recruit in 1942 while a Yale undergraduate and immediately after graduating attended Columbia University Midshipmen's School where he was Regimental Commander and received his commission in October 1944. He served as a Navy Scout and Raider in the Pacific Theatre and in China as a Scout Intelligence Officer and when released from World War II duty in 1946, he affiliated with the Naval Reserve. Returning to active duty in early 1951 he commissioned Underwater Demolition Team FIVE and served in Korea until late 1952. Upon release, he resumed his Reserve participation, commanding seven Reserve units during the next 26 years.

In July 1974, Lyon became the first Special Warfare (SEAL) admiral in the history of the U.S. Navy. He is a graduate of both the National and Naval War Colleges and he has served on the National Naval Reserve Policy Board, the Secretary of Defense Reserve Forces Board, the Chief of Naval Operations Reserve Advisory Board, and was the first Reserve officer ever to be appointed to the Board of Directors of the United States Naval Institute where he served as Chairman of the Editorial Board. Included among his 20 awards and decorations are the Legion of



Merit, Navy Commendation Medal and Combat Action Ribbon.

Active in community affairs, Dick Lyon was elected Mayor of the City of Oceanside in November of 1992, re-elected in 1996 and subsequently retired in 2000 after eight years in office. He is the past President or Chairman of the following: the Board of Trustees of Children's Hospital of Orange County, Oceanside Unified School District, Oceanside Harbor District, San Diego County Automated Regional Justice Information System (ARJIS), San Diego Regional Power Pool, San Diego County Civil Service Commission and Anaheim Rotary Club.

Admiral Lyon is the father of nine children and is married to the former Cynthia Gisslin of Jamestown, New York. The Lyons, including their three youngest children, have resided in Oceanside since 1981.
