The Weingart Foundation dates from June 6, 1951, when Ben Weingart and his wife Stella established The B.W. Foundation as a non-profit California corporation. The name was changed to "Weingart Foundation" in April 1978.

Because of Mr. Weingart's life long concern for the welfare of the homeless, destitute, and people in need, the Foundation has focused its grant making on programs that address the needs of the under-served and the general community. During the past twenty-eight years (1972-2004), the Foundation authorized grants of almost \$661.7 million to support a variety of Southern California social services, educational, and community programs. With assets of approximately \$770 million, the Weingart Foundation is one of the major private foundations in the United States.


Rotary International Convention

ust as Rotary's mission of peace and understanding unites, a spirit of cooperation and togetherness links the cities of Malmö and Copenhagen. The 2006 RI Convention is not only the first Rotary celebration in the Nordic region - it's also the first to embrace the hospitality of *two* host countries. The 97th annual RI Convention kicks off our second century of service and presents a remarkable opportunity to build bridges of friendship and service with fellow Rotarians and come away with new ideas and inspiration that will resonate into the future.



Hans Christian Andersen wrote a fairy tale about her, Disney produced the movie, and Copenhagen maintains a statue in her honour.

The Little Mermaid continues to be the most popular tourist attraction in Denmark and one of the most photographed statues in the world.



The Viking Ship Museum is located at the foot of Roskilde Fjord beside the Roskilde harbour, approximately 30 kilometres from Copenhagen. In 1962, five Viking ships were rescued and resurrected from the harbour.

The Museum was built to house and reconstruct these vessels. All five ships are vastly different. They were built for different purposes, different waters and by different Viking builders - and they all highlight the scope of Viking shipbuilding.

The museum has outgrown its initial role, and there are now other Nordic boats housed here. There is an artificial island next to the museum which houses archaeological workshops and educational institutions.
