# Warning: Rotary-Related Spam Emails

he latest wave of e-mail "phishing" scams targeting Rotarians are especially confusing because the senders' addresses appear to be coming from the "rotaryintl.org" domain used by the Secretariat.

Rotarians should keep in mind that Rotary International will not ask for personal information to be updated via email or other electronic means. Any e-mail that appears to be from the rotaryintl.org domain requesting that Rotarians "confirm account information" by clicking on a link or else their "account will be suspended for security reasons" should be deleted immediately.

Rotarians who may have submitted sensitive personal information such as member access passwords, security codes, or credit card numbers as a result of such a scam are advised to change that information immediately.

Phishing scams, such as the one targeting Rotarians, involve imposters posing as account administrators who attempt to deceive unsuspecting e-mail recipients into divulging personal information, including passwords, credit card numbers, bank account numbers, and other sensitive data. Learn more about how to spot and avoid phishing scams.

Club members should also take precautions when including email addresses on Web pages and online forums where privacy is compromised. By sharing e-mail addresses in messages that are posted on Rotary club or district Web sites that are not secure, Rotarians may unknowingly make themselves and their clubs vulnerable to scams.

All Rotarians are encouraged to read the Rotary International privacy policy for information on the proper use of membership data.



#### 2008-09 Rotary International Presidential Nominee



Dong Kurn Lee, a Rotary Foundation trustee and a member of the Rotary Club of Seoul Hangang, Seoul, Korea, is the selection of the Nominating Committee for President of Rotary International in 2008-09.

Lee is chair of the Bubang Co. Ltd. and Bubang Techron Co. Ltd. manufacturing companies in Seoul and formerly served as a trustee of the Bank of Seoul. In 2005 he was appointed an international goodwill ambassador by the president of Korea.

Interactive premiered with its September 2006 issue, which focused on the longstanding Rotary priorities of literacy and education.

The publication goes beyond words to tell Rotary's story using photo essays, videos, and other media. In the first issue, a narrated

photo essay depicts a woman in Turkey who was born without arms and learned to read and write at age 18 through a Rotary program. Other articles feature Rotarians in Ohio who encourage the children of migrant workers to read as well as Rotaractors in Kentucky who tutor grade-school students. In the September issue, you'll also find a profile of Rotary's Indiana Jones, a Rotarian whose job as an archeologist takes him far and wide in search of answers about the mysteries of ancient religions.
